And it is only fair to give a shout out to Julia Newton's plants and produce. We sold out every time. We look forward to next year's farmers market.

We have several new projects in the works. The immediate event is the Day of the Dead Carnival with the Seeds of Hope Promotoras on October 30, from noon-4:00 pm. It will be held at the Whirligig Park located at 301 Goldsboro Street in Wilson. It is a celebration of our Mexican/Latinex community to remember those who have passed before us. We have partnered with Casa Azul, the Arts Council of Wilson, Casita Brewing Company, The Selkie Gallery, and Historic Downtown Wilson to help promote each

other's events. Join us for some family fun!

Our next project is the Seeds of Hope Wilson mini Food Pantry. It will be located at the corner of Viola Street and Carroll Street. The concept is to allow our neighbors to access the pantry for food, as needed. Winstead's United Methodist Men and the West Nash United Methodist Men have partnered to finance and build this food pantry. The idea is to have canned food and other food products available for needy families, without the stigma of asking for food.

Seeds of Hope Wilson and the Wilson County Library partnered together to expand the Backyard Buddies program to include adults with disabilities. We planned and constructed two portable garden beds for

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IN THE GARDEN

Our community garden is easing into fall, and we are glad for the respite from summer heat. Only a few summer crops remain in the ground; most have been replaced with fall greens, root crops, herbs.

Our fall garden was planted with seedlings that we grew ourselves, including collards, green and red cabbage, kale, and ornamentals like pansies and bok choy. We also planted seeds of carrots, radishes, lettuces, cilantro, and dill. We were

able to share our seeds and seedlings with our gardeners and with outreach projects like the one at Diversified Opportunities.




Flowers have been important in our garden this year. We are growing another round of sunflowers for our STEM students at Vick Elementary. We plan to cut flowers and seed heads and send them over to be used in the classroom. We are also growing a large bed of marigolds, 'flor de muerto', that our gardeners will use to celebrate Dia de los Muertos at the end of October.

We are always finding opportunities for learning in the garden. Late summer and early fall are a great time to observe both "good" and "bad" bugs, and we have seen many of each! We love to see beneficials like preying mantises and assassin bugs, and we think it's wise to teach everyone how to recognize destructive insects like the tomato hornworm, and even dangerous insects like the black widow spider. Everyone has their place in the food web, and we try not to kill anything without a good reason to.

We are beginning to create and plant some beds in the shady areas behind Seeds of Hope House. Susan Poel, a fellow Master Gardener in Charlotte, donated some very nice woodland shade perennial plants that we can use to beautify the property. The area has been cleared and mulch laid down. We will need some help with tree and brush removal in order to complete this project— if you are able to help, please join us for a Tuesday or Saturday morning workday, 8-10 am, or we can make other arrangements.

We had a delightful cooking class recently at Seeds of Hope House, at which we prepared Swedish meatballs (using our *Hunters for the Hungry* ground venison) with mashed potatoes and gravy. We plan to cook again on Saturday, Nov 20 starting at 7:00 am, with the focus being an American



Thanksgiving. We will prepare turkey, gravy, pumpkin pie, collards from the garden, and whatever else we can squeeze in. All are invited to an informal turkey lunch that day at noon, in the Outdoor Classroom!

BACKYARD BUDDIES

Last spring, Executive Director, Jim Howard, wanted to reach out to the community by offering a gardening opportunity. Seeds of Hope Wilson would provide garden boxes, soil and seedlings for neighborhood households to be able to raise and enjoy their own fresh produce. This was written into a Resourceful Communities grant submitted in early March for funding to provide monthly incentives to each participating household during this 6 month process. Jim spoke with Winstead UMC United Methodist Men (UMM), who constructed the garden boxes. Winstead UMM were also asked to furnish soil for the boxes. Julia Newton, Garden Coordinator, had plants/seedlings ready for the participants.
